Reflection

November 2025

The last few months have been a busy time for funerals across both our churches. At the time of writing this, I will have had 8 funerals between the middle of August and the end of November. Some of them have been church members, others related to those connected with our wider church families. Each one is a person with a web of connections from family and friends. With their deaths, those webs develop a hole.

In the midst of this the Church has the opportunity to offer its crucial pastoral ministry of caring for those in the most need. The care we offer is not just through me meeting the families and preparing and leading the services, but through those who steward when the services are in church, those who do the administration and organizing, those who arrange flowers, play the organ. However, it isn't just in the official roles that we, as the Church, minister. Those who turn up to the services, sing the hymns, offer a word of comfort or a smile also contribute to that healing ministry of the Church.

There are many professionals involved in caring for those who have died and their families. The vast majority carry out this service with compassion and empathy. They need and deserve our prayers. What we in the Church are able to offer is that lasting presence long after the funeral has happened. The pastoral ministry to which we are all called – to be agents of love, hope, and presence – isn't limited to just the funeral service. Instead, we are called to carry on remembering those who have lost loved ones and reaching out to them. November 2nd is, in the Church, known as All Souls' Day. It is the day when we remember those who have died, especially in the last year. The remembering that the Church does isn't just a looking back to when particular people were alive on earth. Instead, we remember not only their lives amongst us, but that, in God, their lives continue. The letter to the Hebrews encourages us to remember that we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses. Charles Wesley commends us with these words:

let all the saints terrestrial sing with those to glory gone; for all the servants of our King, in earth and heaven, are one.

So, in this month of remembering, may we do so holding on to that hope that, in God, we remain one united people in worship and service, until we all gather at the throne of God.

Updates from home

My holiday to Istanbul, Troy and Ephesus.

At the beginning of October, I went to Turkey with 'Just you' which is a holiday company for solo travellers. I have been away with them several times before but this holiday involved staying at four different hotels so I wondered



how I would cope living out of my suitcase. That proved an unfounded worry! More difficult was the amount of walking and the length of coach journeys between hotels and ancient sites. We travelled 1700 miles in the coach. I discovered Turkey is a vast country.

We landed in Istanbul to spend two nights there. On the day after our arrival, we were taken by our guide on a walking tour of the old city, the Blue Mosque and the Grand Bazaar. The next day

before taking our coach to our next hotel we visited Topkapi Palace, the impressive residence of the Ottoman Sultans. Then we were off to our second hotel from where the next day we visited Troy where they are still excavating the ruins.

Another hotel! From this hotel in Izmir, we went to Ephesus



which was a place I had wanted to visit on previous visits to the Turkish coast but when I was on those holidays it was in the summer which is very hot! Ephesus was very crowded but lived up to my expectations. It is amazing to think that it dates back to Roman times and St Paul would have walked where we walked.

From Izmir our coach took us to Bursa overnight and our fourth hotel. The following morning, we were once again on the trail of the Ottoman Empire

and went to visit the Grand Mosque and the tombs of the first Ottoman Sultans.

Back to Istanbul and our last night in Turkey. A boat trip in the afternoon to admire the city from the Bosphorus. The weather was chilly as we went against the tide but when we turned around the sun came out and it was a bit warmer.



Back to the UK on Day 9. Overall, it was a great holiday. All my fellow holiday makers (34 of us in all) were good company. Our local guide was great. He had a lot of knowledge which he regaled us with (probably it bit too much for me to take in). He also managed not to lose any of the party which was a feat in itself! Janet Walton

A trip to Bletchley Park

Every year for the past 8 years we have had a family reunion in Buckinghamshire, and every year I have said 'we must go to Bletchley Park'. Well this year we finally made it.



It is somewhere I have wanted to go for many years. It certainly lived up to my expectations! I was astounded at the number of German / Russian Enigma machines they had, and seeing the code breakers Bombe machine was amazing! The size of

the bombe machine and the amount of work it must have taken to build was phenomenal. We learnt a lot about the people who worked at Bletchley – 8,000 people in total, who worked in 3 x 8 hour shifts, the majority of which were women.



We learnt that not everyone who tried to get in got a place there, with even JRR Tolkien (the writer of the Lord of The Rings) being denied a place.



The story of Alan Turing was told throughout a museum section dedicated to him, with the letter pardoning him for being gay signed by the then Prime Minister Gordon Brown. They even had a £50 note with Alan Turing's picture on it, with the serial number of the date they managed to break the Enigma code.

As soon as the war ended the staff were laid off, apart from the WRENS who had the job of chopping the machines into pieces.

Some of the Nissan huts were set up with the original style lighting, sounds and scents from the machinery so you could imagine the conditions the workers were in.

It was a fascinating place, with so many stories to tell, and I really enjoyed my visit.
