Reflection

December 2025 / January 2026

This December, and possibly beyond, our Zoom Bible Book Club are going to be considering some reflections of a book by Paula Gooder called, *Women of the Nativity*. Paula has written meditations from the perspective of 9 women connected with the wider story of Advent and Christmas. Using Advent themes of Patriarchs and Prophets, Paula considers the lives of some of the Old Testament women – Sarah and Huldah. There are reflections on some of the obvious women of the Christmas narrative – Mary and Elizabeth. Then there are some created characters whose stories are not told or whose names are not known in the Bible but who could have been present – Abigail whose husband was also serving in the Temple when Zechariah had his encounter with Gabriel; Shiphrah whose stable Mary and Joseph used, and who was present to help with the birth of Jesus.

In a world often dominated by men, and by the powerful, it is an important reminder of the women who have been present throughout the story of salvation, and especially the story of God's coming among us in the birth of Jesus. People who have often been written out, whose names and stories we now have to invent, but whose real names and stories and known by God, whose parts in God's story continue to be remembered by God.

As we gear up for Christmas celebrations and the beginning of a new calendar year with all that might hold, some of us may feel as though the part we play in God's story in this community is recorded by others. As both our congregations celebrate 125th anniversaries I am reminded that so often part of the telling of the church's story is reciting the list of names of ministers.

However, this Advent, Christmas, and New Year, may we be reminded that all of us play an important part in God's ongoing story of salvation in our community – by the way we speak to others, the acts of kindness we show, our works for justice and mercy for those who rarely experience either, our joining our voices with our brothers and sisters in worship of the God who delights in us all. Even if our names or stories are not recorded in the history books for future generations, know that our names and stories are always treasured by God.

So, as we journey through this holy time, seek to play your part in God's story of salvation here where you are.

May you know the peace and hope Christ this season. *Will*

Updates from home

We have recently returned from one of our long trips abroad and this time the destination was South America. This was a wonderful trip and include here are some of the highlights in a brief summary.

Ecuador

We started our tour in Quito, the capital of Ecuador which stands at over 9,300ft above sea level. We stayed in the older part of the city which has many interesting historical buildings, mostly from the time the country was a Spanish colony. Here is a picture of one



of the many Churches. After our brief stay in Quito, we travelled to the Ecuadorian part of the Amazon rainforest. To get there involved a short flight, a 2-hour ride on a fast motorboat and then a further 1 and a half hours on a paddled canoe. The location however was worth it as the lodges we stayed in were set on the edge of a beautiful lagoon. The next two days were spent exploring parts of the jungle either in a canoe or on foot. In that time, we were lucky enough to see some wonderful wildlife.





<u>Peru</u>

After returning to Quito, we flew down to Cusco in Peru, another high city standing at over 11,000ft above sea level. We both had to adjust to the altitude but neither of us suffered any actual sickness. Again, we stayed in the older part of the city. This city was the Inca capital and would have had many splendid examples of Inca architecture had the Spanish not destroyed most of them. However, it was still impressive and an enjoyable place to visit. Cusco is the base to visit Machu Pichu and we travelled to Aguas Caliente (the town at the base of Machu Pichu) by train.



for our visit. We were lucky with the weather and so saw it at its best. We also returned to Cusco by train with fantastic scenery to enjoy on the journey.

Our next destination in Peru was Lake Titicaca.

To get there we took another train journey, this time it took ten and a half hours and

travelled over a pass in the Andes. Taking us to a height of over 13,000ft. before descending to Puno (the main town at the northern end of the lake). Lake Titicaca is the highest navigable lake in the world at 12,500ft above sea level and covers an area of over 3,200 sq miles. The most interesting aspect of the northern end of the lake are the floating islands that are created and lived on by indigenous peoples.



After our stay in Puno we started a long days journey down to La Paz. We had a private transfer to Copacabana (a town on the border with Bolivia). Here we had a catamaran tour out to Sun island and I had an opportunity to try some kayaking on the lake. After that tour we had a further long drive to get us to La Paz.

Bolivia

La Paz is the highest administrative capital in the world at almost 12,000ft above sea level. We had little time to explore the city as we were needing to catch up with our laundry. The public transport however was interesting as it consisted of a network of cable cars! We left La Paz and flew to Uyuni, the base for exploring the salt flats.



The salt flats are truly spectacular covering an area of over 4,000sq miles. This picture is of us on a small rocky "island" in the middle of the flats. On our second day at Uyuni we were taken into the mountains surrounding the flats to see some traditional towns and lakes.

Argentina

We left Bolivia on a long but spectacular car journey to get us to the northern Argentinian town of Purmamarca. This was just an overnight stop before we carried on the next day to Salta. This city has some very fine Spanish colonial architecture including the cathedral.



the Brazilian side of the falls.

We left Salta to visit a town called Cafayate. This town is the centre for the highest vineyards in Argentina but is lovely in its own right. We were shown some of the vineyards and were able to sample some of the locally produced wines. They were quite different but also delicious.

We returned to Salta for our flight out to Iguazu. We were lucky enough to have a tour of both the Argentinian side and





After our visits to the spectacular waterfalls at Iguazu we flew into Buenos Airies, the capital of Argentina. We had a tour of the city and with a lot of walking saw most of the important sights of this very large city. We left the city to take a flight to the Patagonia region of Argentina. We wanted to visit two particular areas, the first being the Perito Merino glacier near the town of El Calafate and the second being the lakes and mountains near Bariloche.





After leaving Bariloche we returned to Buenos Aries before taking a ferry to our final country Uruguay.

<u>Uruguay</u>

The ferry ride from Buenos Aries is very short and brings you to a town called Colonia del Sacramento in Uruguay. The old part of this town is lovely with its origins going back to when the Portuguese owned the area. After a couple of days we transferred to Montevideo, the capital of Uruguay and a very important port. We enjoyed a tour of the city and a visit to a local winery to sample some locally produced wines. We left Montevideo by ferry to return to Buenos Aries for one last night before making the long journey home.

This was a marvellous trip and one we will not forget. Blessings Chris and Caroline

somewhat spoiled seeing the beauty of the city, We again opted to do our own thing, disembarking, and staying in the vicinity of the port, as this was very convenient for the city. Two of our companions walked to Miniature Wunderland, which houses the worlds largest model railway. They reported back that it was wonderful, but very crowded, and well worth the visit. Other passengers did an optional scenic coach excursion but couldn't see much! However we had an enjoyable day and made the best of it. We left Hamburg that evening, sailing back down the River Elbe in darkness, as indeed we had arrived.

Thereafter there was another sea day and on the fifth morning we docked back in Portsmouth, after a lovely trip with good company.



We cruised on Borealis, (1000 passengers), which is one of the Fred Olsen ships. This was a first time for us with this cruise line, and we were impressed. The ship was comfortable, décor classy, food good, cabins excellent, and entertainment varied. There was an amazing clock which spans three decks and forms the center piece of the atrium. It shows time zones from around the world on all four sides. What was not to like? The whole cruise was enjoyable, and a very pleasant short break.

My thanks, as always, to Ellie, Valerie, Amorette and Molly for leading the girls in the various activities and to the parents who bring the girls so regularly each week.


